Supporting nurses in primary health care



Top tips for nurses looking to get into primary health care nursing:

The following is some foundational information that may help those pursuing a job in primary health care. It is by no means an extensive list but provides a starting point:

Networking and key points

- Seek a workplace that currently has nurses working there to assist you in your transition to primary health care or seek out an experienced nurse who is willing to mentor you.

- Use your local PHN's (Primary Health Networks) in your area to assist in finding a workplace that might be looking for a nurse. To find your local PHN visit: http://www.health.gov.au/internet/main/publishing.nsf/Content/phn-locator
- Each primary health care setting will differ in some way and can have a variety of different needs and focuses, dependent on the patient population, demographic as well as the health professional interests and skill sets. Ensure you ask and/or research the population health needs of the area your potential workplace services
- There are a number of skills such as triage and assessment that are very transferrable to the primary health care setting. Ensure you sell yourself on these points when looking for a role
- Consider undertaking a 'trial' placement where you can shadow the existing staff to see what a 'day in the life of' might be like.
